

Hooked on Genealogy

I am one of those people who got hooked on genealogy a while ago. My Immediate family lived around Harrison where I grew up, and I knew no other family members. Two years ago, I was pleasantly surprised to learn that one of my ancestor lines settled in Crosby Township where I now live. His name was Adam Myers who was born around 1750 in Germany in the Hess-Kassel vicinity in a small town named Reinhardshofen. He had completed his apprenticeship as a blacksmith and was returning home when taken by a press gang, forced into the English army, and was sent to America to fight in the Revolutionary War. The voyage to America was difficult. Men were packed in like herrings. Every six soldiers shared a wooden spoon and a tin cup. Rations were limited and the water stored in casks stank and had to be filtered through cloth before drinking. The Hessian soldiers, commanded by Lieutenant General Wilhelm von Knyphausen, fought in every major battle.

America had already been settled by quite a few Germans. When they learned that their brothers were coming to fight them, they were outraged. This did not escape General George Washington's notice. He created a campaign to turn around the sentiments and possibly the war by encouraging the fierce Hessian soldiers to defect and join their American countrymen. They would receive full pardon, land, and cattle. There were immediate results and Adam Myers was among those deserters. Seven months after Cornwallis' surrender at Yorktown, King George III negotiated peace. Adam learned that there were many Germans in Pennsylvania and headed in that direction.

Adam married a lady named Anna Catharina. They lived in Salt Lick Township, Fayette County, Pennsylvania. His family's names were found in the Good Hope Lutheran Church records. His first three children, Frederick, Anna Catharina, and Mary Elizabeth were not on the baptism records but John, Barbara, Henry, Johannes Jacob and Anna Christina were. He was a farmer and listed on several tax tables owning over 100 acres, cattle and a horse.

Many people journeyed through Fayette County heading from the east to the west to try their fortunes in Ohio and other parts of the western frontier. Adam and his wife, who were in their fifties, also decided to start anew. The easiest means of transportation was by flatboat down the Ohio River and it is supposed that this also was the Myers' choice. There was plenty of rich farmland in a place called Crosby Township. He bought property from John Keever, and it was recorded in 1815; however he was listed in the township in 1809. The property was located along Edgewood, Dick, and Oxford (later the Fliehman farm).

His children married local people except my direct line ancestor, Frederick, who married May Poe from Pennsylvania. She was the daughter of George Poe, who was related to the famous Indian fighters, Adam and Andrew Poe. Eventually they moved to Jackson Township, Dearborn County, Indiana. Anna Catharina "Catie" married Brant Agnew. They were among the original families that

founded the Whitewater Shakers. However, Catie was not as committed to the religious sect as her husband and his family. She talked Brant into leaving and they, with their children moved to Pontoosuc Township, Hancock County, Illinois. One of their sons was accused of burning down the Morman Temple in Nauvoo, Illinois. Mary Elizabeth married George Iseminger from Morgantown, Butler County. They moved to Monroe County, Indiana, with his folks. John married Mary Iseminger, George's sister, and they raised their family in Crosby Township. He was one of the founders of the United Brethren Church in New Haven. He inherited Adam's farm. Barbara, who married John Caley, died young. Henry married Martha McLain from Butler County. They moved to Indiana. His grandson was Datus Ensign Myers, a wellknown artist. His great grandson, Debs Myers, was a well -known writer, managing editor of Newsweek Magazine, and speech-writer for Adlai Stevenson and Robert F. Kennedy. Little is known of the last two children except that they may have died before or during the family's journey.




In Case You Missed it . . .
