We have had some wonderful speakers that have given us informative and enjoyable presentations over the years. This year was no exception. These were the speakers for 2023, and next year will be just as delightful.



Mike Minges: Lieutenant Tom Griffin and the Doolittle Raiders (April)

Lt. Griffin was a navigator on Doolittle's B-25 bomber the "Whirling Dervish" that bombed Japan. His plane crash-landed, and with the help of the Chinese, escaped to safety only later to be

shot down over Germany becoming a POW the rest of the war.

Dr. Susan Pinney and Jenny Buckholz: New Information About Health Risks in the Fernald Community Cohort (May)

Dr. Pinney, Research Director and Jenny Buckholz, RN, MSN, of the Fernald Community Cohort Program gave us an update on the exciting studies conducted using the biospecimens from the Fernald Medical Monitoring Program. In *July* members took a field trip to the Fernald Education Center to see the displays on the history of the Fernald Feed Production Plant.
